Basic management of OH

- Careful history and medication review is critical
- Most can be diagnosed and treated by any physician
 - Orthostatic vitals are very informative and should be done !!
 - Home BP logs (or ABPM) provide additional information
 - Additional specialized testing may be indicated when the cause is not clear
- Non-pharmacological measures are effective and first-line
- Pharmacological management
 - Must include close monitoring
