ADVOCACY PLAN THE NINE STEPS TO ACHIEVE CHANGE

- 1. What do we want? (goals and objectives)
- 2. Who can give it to us? (key decision-makers)
- 3. What do they need to hear? (messages)
- 4. Who do they need to hear it from? (influencers, coalitions, alliances)
- 5. How do we get them to hear it? (delivery)
- 6. What have we got? (resources; strengths)
- 7. What do we need to develop? (challenges; gaps)
- 8. How do we begin? (first steps)
- 9. How will we know it's working, or not working? (evaluation)
